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## THE EMBLEM OF THE COLLEGE

The three-lettered regalia of S.A.C (St. Aloysius College) in blend is placed at the foot of the emblem and is crowned by the college motto *Lift Up Your Hearts*. In the centre of the emblem is a lamp whose flame is set in a circle. The encircled flame is contoured by the three sides of a triangle pointing to the mystery of the Holy Trinity. The ineffable ardour of the flame is the heart of the triangle. The triangle is flanked by a lily in blossom on its left and by a rice plant slightly bent by the load of sheaves on the right. While the lily invites emulation by the virtue of its purest gaze, the sheaves beckon one to bear fruits that shall last. Thus the uplifted heart that stands for the spirit of the college looks up to the flame, the lily and the sheaves, as it steers its course through the shoals and eddies of time.

## I – INTRODUCTION

### *St. Aloysius College, Elthuruth*

St. Aloysius College, Elthuruth, is a first grade college affiliated to the University of Calicut. It is run by Fathers who belong to the congregation of Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI) founded by the Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara. The CMI community of Fathers and Brothers work in various educational institutions and social centres throughout the country and abroad.

St. Aloysius College, Elthuruth, is administered by St. Mary's Monastery, a House under the Devamatha Province of the congregation. The other institutions in the same campus and under the administration of the Monastery are St. Aloysius L.P., U.P., High School, Higher Secondary School, St. Aloysius Boarding House, St. Berchmans' Minor Seminary and St. Mary's Parish Church.

The College was sanctioned by the Government of Kerala as per order G.O. Ms 40/69/Edn. dt.21.1.69 and was given provisional affiliation to the Kerala University on 27 June 1968. Permanent affiliation was accorded to the College by the University of Calicut on 15 March 1971. In July 1978 the College was upgraded with B.A. Economics. The college obtained U.G.C. affiliation [GO No. F.8 – 10/84 (CP)] in April 1984. To cater to the increasing academic demand, joining hands with government initiatives, the college started self financing programmes from 2004.

Today St. Aloysius College is an institution of higher education under the University of Calicut with sixteen undergraduate courses (Chemistry, Commerce-Banking, Commerce-Co operation, Commerce-Computer, Commerce-Finance, BBA-Finance, BBA HRM, BA Multi Media, Economics, English, Mathematics, Physics, Psychology, Zoology, B Voc Gemmology and B Voc Jewellery Designing) and eight post-graduate courses (Chemistry, Commerce, Economics, English, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics and Zoology). Further, the College offers a doctoral programme through its Research Centre in English.

#### LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

St.Aloysius College Library started to function in a new multi-facility Library Complex from January 2013. The Library has been updated with 34637 Books. The Library is fully computerized and data transferred to KOHA-Integrated Library Management Software. Further, an Online Catalogue Searching Facility is provided. The New Arrival Section helps the academic community to be updated concerning the newly arrived documents in the library. There is an E-Gate Register at the entrance of the library which records user statistics, and, the E-Notice Board before the Library provides a current awareness service.

The Library subscribes to more than 90 print Journals and Magazines. The Library also subscribes N-LIST e-resources package which provides 97000 e-books and 6000 e-journals which help the academic community to search the e-resources from anywhere with the username and password provided by the INFLIBNET centre.

As a part of the CMI Education Mission, St. Aloysius College started a Women's Hostel in the College premises in the year 2013. It offers facilities to female students admitted to various courses in the College. It functions under St. Aloysius Management and the College Community is proud and immensely happy to receive the kind support and collaboration of the Sisters of St. Martha, a Catholic women's Religious Congregation. Therefore the hostel inmates are under the direct management and care of the Sr. Warden who takes care of the day-to-day administration of the Hostel.

## TRAVEL FACILITY FOR STUDENTS

The Travel Facility Committee of the College monitors college bus services. The committee has laid down the following rules for strict compliance by the students.

1. Students who wish to avail travel facility by college bus must remit the fees for one year.
2. I DC and I PG students shall pay the fees when they start availing the travel facility .
3. II DC, III DC and II PG students should pay the fee on or before 15<sup>th</sup> of June.
4. Students must carry their college Identity Cards and bus passes daily and they must be produced at the time of checking.
5. College buses leave the college according to the time schedule announced. Any change in the time schedule will be made only after prior announcement by the travel facility co-ordinators.
6. Students will be allowed to avail the facility only if they strictly comply with the rules of decency and the instructions given by the coordinators while travelling in the college buses.
7. Complaints, if any, about the functioning of college buses shall be brought to the attention of the coordinators in charge.



## TUTOR SYSTEM

St. Aloysius College has introduced and implemented the tutorial system as envisaged by the UGC, to enable the advanced learners to reach the pinnacle of excellence and the slow learners to reach the minimum qualifying level, and also to improve the rapport between students and teachers in a systematic way. It is a system which we practice to understand and evaluate our students individually and collectively. Usually 15 students in UG courses are assigned to one tutor. The tutor monitors and continuously evaluates the academic performance of the students assigned to him/her. This helps to generate better results in examinations, increased participation in co-curricular activities, better discipline in the campus and respectful relationship between teachers and students.

## PLACEMENT CELL

The Placement Cell of the college functions under the guidance of a staff coordinator and endeavours to impart training to students in choosing an appropriate career in future and co-ordinates the various career guidance programmes conducted by the departments. The cell also organizes career guidance, seminars and personality development programmes for graduate students. The final year students are trained to face both personal and general interviews. The cell subscribes to various career magazines and displays on notice board news regarding important career opportunities. As a result students of our college get placed through campus selection in various Companies like Wipro, Goa Institute of Communication in English etc., Further the Placement Cell facilitates students to win scholarships such as those awarded by Kerala State Rutronnix.

## WALK WITH A SCHOLAR INITIATIVE

Walk with a Scholar Programme is an innovative programme designed by the Office of New Initiatives Department of Higher Education, Kerala. The faculty and students of St. Aloysius actively participate in it to develop themselves. The scheme introduces the idea of mentoring and builds on the concept of mentor as a 'guide' and 'friend'. Thirty students from the aided stream are identified every academic year after a rigorous screening process for the programme. Each group consists of six mentees under a mentor. All mentors interact with mentees and focus on the dreams and interest of the mentees to help them set their goals for future.

The Scholar Support Programme is the new initiative from the Government of Kerala in which St. Aloysius actively engages in. It aims to impart personalized additional support to needy students through tutorials, additional lectures, question banks and interactive sessions. It also forms quality circles in the college for the dissemination of information through personal and web based modes. The programmes are implemented for the first year students of the under graduate courses .

## ASAP

ASAP, Additional Skill Acquisition Programme, a joint initiative of General Education Department and Higher Education Department, Government of Kerala, is a project aimed to equip young population with skills in cutting edge sectors in order to effectively alleviate the unemployment problem in the state. St. Aloysius College is one of the 10 colleges in the state to receive a five star rating for its excellence in training students. It is ranked 1st in the district and 3rd in the state. The college offers the ASAP level 1 programme, which is a combination of three courses, namely, Communication Skills in English, Basic IT and an Elective Domain Specific Skill Course. The Programmes are developed, delivered, assessed and certified with the active participation of



the related industries to ensure labour market acceptance of the programmes. The college also acts as a centre for ASAP 21 days residential Training Partner Scheme Programme every year.

## STUDENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS (SDP)

Shri. Sony Varghese (Academic Administrator)

SDP is started with a vision to provide value based education to the students to guarantee them a life time of success. The mission is to provide professional guidance in the early stages to prepare them for the right career path through a customized support.

SDP provides different platforms to train teachers and to give orientation programs for all the students. It aims to set the objectives of the students right from the respective academic programs throughout the year.

The SDP programs include imparting basics of management, giving coaching classes for Civil Service examinations, PSC & Bank recruitment, teaching effective communication and basics of computer programs.

Other initiatives for the students are outbound programs, industry visits, project tie-ups with companies and a finishing school for the final year students to get them ready for placements.

SDP also has tie-ups with banks, companies and management associations providing industrial exposure to the students during their studies.





#### IV. ASSOCIATIONS AND CLUBS

- \* **Library Club** : The Library Club is established to encourage the younger generation to use the resources of St.Aloysius College, Elthuruth and to inculcate an ambience of library centered learning for the multi faceted development of individuals, contributing to nation building. The club aims to :
  - \* Fulfill the vision & mission of the Library; "Connecting People with information and empowering them with knowledge"
  - \* Stimulate interest in reading, viewing, and evaluating information.
  - \* Help students learn more about the Library Resources and emerging information retrieval technology.
  - \* Organize visits to important libraries.
- \* **The Subject Associations** : The Heads of Departments shall organise Subject Associations for the degree and postgraduate students, with special rules for their functioning. Each Subject Association shall have an Executive Committee, consisting of a staff member as President, a Secretary and a Treasurer and if necessary, a few additional members. Each Subject Association can collect a membership fee not exceeding Rs.25/- per head. The fund of the Subject Association will be operated separately from that of the College Union.
- \* **College Union** : The College Union activities offer students opportunities to grow in co-operation with others in areas of personal and academic interests as well as in areas of service to fellow human beings. The College Union has a wide variety of student activities that help mould a true education. These activities pertain to cultural, social, religious, athletic and artistic areas. The elected class representatives will elect the office bearers of the College Union Council. One male and one female representative will be elected from each of the co- education classes. Two representatives will be elected from males only females only classes.
- \* **Fine Arts Club** : The fine arts club in the college will be primarily concerned with preparing students for the College Youth Festival, College Day, D-Zone and Inter Zone Competitions and other competitions



at the District and the State level. The club will also support, offer suggestions and coordinate the effective functioning of the Literary and Film Club, Drama Club, Music and Dance Club etc.

- \* **Christals** : The association for Christian Activities and Value Education Programmes that has been at work for years in the college was christened 'Christals' in September 1997. The name, though homophonic of the English word 'crystals', is intended to carry a metaphorical suggestion that the members of the association, namely, all the students and the members of staff of St.Aloysius College should try to become 'Christ Crystals'(Christals). On the third thursdays of every month regular talks/ classes on Value Education are conducted for the students under the leadership of Christals. Value education classes are concerned with value development among today's young people. The Club also arranges orientation programme for the Faculty, the Administrative Staff and the Students.
- \* **Women's Club** : The activities of the Women's Club are carried out in the college through the AIACHE's Centre for Women's Development, Delhi. Women's Club conducts seminars, extension lecturers, debates, speech competitions etc., with special emphasis on women and their role in the present-day society. It organizes various social awareness programmes so as to help the students to understand empathetically the weak and the downtrodden of the society. The objectives of the club are:
  1. To cultivate leadership skills among women
  2. To create awareness about the social problems faced by women and to work for the empowerment of women
  3. To make women realise their equal responsibility in building society.
- \* **Quiz Club** : The Quiz Club aims to foster the spirit of inquiry and sense of curiosity among the students, leading to better awareness of the world around them. The club helps students to prepare for competitions through supply of materials, discussions and guidance. The students are encouraged to take part in various Quiz Competitions at State and National Level.



- \* **Nature Club** : The Nature Club tries to impart a vital awareness about environment and undertakes activities concerning conservation of nature. The club offers a variety of experiences to promote interest and knowledge about forests and the environment. It strives to foster concern to protect Flora & Fauna and generate awareness regarding the economic, cultural and scientific dimensions of preserving nature.
- \* **E.D. Club** : The Entrepreneurial Development Club identifies potential entrepreneurs in the Department of Commerce and promotes entrepreneurial activities inculcating entrepreneurial trades and managerial skills. They also conduct seminars to motivate members to begin industrial ventures.
- \* **E.T. Club** : The Economic Times Club is an interactive forum for students, which motivates them to interact with the corporate sector directly and through various events organised in the form of seminars, Panel Discussion, Conferences etc. It encourages regular reading of the *Economic Times* among students and motivates participation in interactive events such as Quizes and Management Trainings.
- \* **Tourism Club** : The Tourism Club comprising fifty members under the aegis of District Tourism Promotion Council goes about with the onerous task of discovering the tourism potential of our State. It conducts orientation classes on tourism and explores its possibilities with discussions and quiz programmes. The members are engaged in activities like identification of tourist spots in the District, guiding village tours, tourism spot survey, interactive sessions with foreign tourists etc.
- \* **Literary & Film Club** : The Literary & Film Club aims to groom students who have a taste for literature and film. It conducts competitions in recitations, composition of poems, essay writing and story writing. Further, it provides opportunities for students to perform for the radio and TV stations and cable networks. They hold film appreciation classes and arrange screening of master pieces for the whole college. Occasionally a campus film is made with the help of the club.



- \* **Music & Dance Club** : The Music & Dance Club comprises of students who have already received training in dance and music from their younger days. These students identify others in the campus who evince talents and impart training to them. They participate in college level and University level cultural competitions.
- \* **Health Club** : The Health Club advocates health and wellness to students. The club members play an effective role in encouraging their peers to consider and develop responsible habits, attitudes and life styles regarding health and wellness by actively promoting healthy and safe life style decisions.
- \* **Drama Club** : The Club aims to spread interest in the theory and practice of theatre in the campus. It proposes to encourage an active involvement among the members regardless of previous experience in theatre related activities.
- \* **St. Aloysius FM** : The FM Radio venture of our college is run by the student RJs and technicians with support from professionals working in this field. It aims to generate youthfulness, responsibility and change to the St.Aloysius academic fraternity
- \* **Equal Opportunity Cell** : The existence of social, political, and economic discriminations is a bane to the democratic Indian State. To make students more responsive to the needs and constraints of the disadvantaged social groups, St. Aloysius College has, under the directive of the UGC, established an Equal Opportunity Cell in the Campus. The Cell works to ensure equity and equal opportunity to the community at large.
- \* **N.C.C. (Boy's Division and Girls' Wing)** : The National Cadet Corps (NCC) offers opportunity for military training and social service to college students, without imposing on them any obligation for active military service. The aims of the NCC are (a) To develop character, comradeship, ideal of service and capacity for leadership among the youth, (b) To provide service training to the young so as to stimulate interest in the defence of the country, and, (c) To build up a reserve of potential officers so that the



defence service of the country can expand in a national emergency. At the moment, the 24th Kerala Bn NCC Boys' section of the college has 54 cadets and Bn NCC Girls' wing has 52 cadets on the rolls. As the activities of the students' organizations are banned on the campus, the cadets who engage themselves in such activities will be removed from the roll of NCC. The leaders will be removed from their posts, if they do not attend the classes regularly or if they are involved in acts of indiscipline.

- \* **National Service Scheme (NSS)** : The National Service Scheme aims at providing education through community service. Membership in NSS is voluntary and is strictly on selective basis. 300 students are selected to make National Service Corps. Each such student is subject to its discipline and code of behaviour. Every student attending the NSS will be required to devote a minimum time equivalent to 120 hours each academic year. Those who complete 240 hours of work in 2 years are eligible for a Certificate issued by the University and a weightage of 10 marks. At present various inspiring and informative programmes are undertaken by the two NSS Units Nos 5 and 46 under the guidance of two programme officers. The volunteers who have regular attendance in all the classes and take termly examinations without fail alone will be eligible to attend the annual ten day camp. As the activities of the student political organizations are banned on the campus, the volunteers who engage themselves in such activities will be removed from the roll of NSS. Leaders will be removed from their posts, if they do not attend classes regularly or if they are involved in acts of indiscipline.
- \* **Red Ribbon Club** : The Red Ribbon Club functions as a constituent of the NSS units with the objective of conscientizing the students in the campus as well as the public outside concerning AIDS through awareness campaigns and seminars. They strive to remove the social stigma attached to AIDS patients by instilling an empathetic attitude in the people. The club members get actual experience of visiting AIDS patients and serving them in order to give them a greater sense of self-respect.



- \* **Former Students Association** : The Association was established to motivate active involvement of former students in the growth of their Alma Mater. It also provides opportunities for the former students of St.Aloysius College to come into contact with the Alma Mater and with one another. All outgoing students become its ordinary members by paying a membership fee. Annual Meeting of the Association will be held every year, on the first Sunday of December at 2.30 pm., in the college auditorium. Its activities will be arranged by the Executive Body constituted as per the by-law.
- \* **Parent Teacher Association** : For the efficient conduct of the college it is necessary that the guardians of students take a more positive interest in the college life of their wards. They have to share with the college administration the responsibility for maintaining proper discipline. The guardians have to meet the principal at least *once in a semester*, and enquire about their ward's progress and conduct. They should also attend the PTA meetings whenever informed.
- \* **Medical Aid Fund** : The students who require medical help may apply for assistance from the Medical Aid Fund.
- \* **Golden Jubilee Skill Development Programme for Girls** : As part of the Golden Jubilee Celebration of the college, the two units of the NSS (46, 5) launched a new venture to enhance the skills of female students of the college. The students are given an opportunity to learn sewing professionally, thus helping them to be financially independent and self reliant. On successful completion of the course, the students will be awarded a diploma in Sewing and Fashion Technology.

## V - GENERAL REGULATIONS

### COLLECTION OF FEES

1. Tuition fees and special fees will be collected from the students of senior classes within the period of seven consecutive working days beginning from the date of re-opening of each academic year. In the case of 1st year



classes tuition fees due with special fees and caution deposit will be collected on the date of admission.

2. Tuition fees of the students of self financing courses will be collected in each Semester.
3. The Principal is entitled to change the fee date for particular class/classes so fixed to an earlier or to a subsequent date if it so happens that the college is ordered to remain closed by a competent authority on that particular date originally proposed for collecting fees.
4. If any student fails to pay the fees or special fees on the due date he/she shall be liable to pay a fine along with the fees or special fees on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.
5. If the fees or special fees with the fine is not paid on or before the last date fixed for the fine an additional fine will have to be paid. If the fees and fines of an instalment are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment of the instalment the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the college with effect from the date following the expiry of this period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance from the date of removal from the rolls of the college. If the student is to be re-admitted he/she has to apply for the special permission of the Principal with a re-admission fee and has to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. The re-admitted student will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of re-admission.
6. The names of defaulters of an instalment will be published on the notice board immediately after the expiry of the last opportunity fixed for payment of the instalment.
7. Students who are admitted for a term to make up shortage of attendance for the course he / she was undergoing, should pay full fees and caution deposit at the time of admission.
8. Every student is liable to pay the prescribed fee for the whole term during any part of which his/her name is on the college rolls.
9. A student who leaves a particular college affiliated to any of the Universities in Kerala and joins another college so affiliated during the course of a



term is liable to pay the prescribed fees for the concerned term in both the colleges.

10. Tuition fee remitted to the college for a particular course need not be remitted again in case a student takes his/her T.C. for getting admission in another college. This is applicable even if the student is readmitted in the same college from where he/she took his/her T.C.

**N.B.** For every payment made to the office a receipt will be issued by the Cashier which should be produced as and when called upon to do so. The identity card with the candidate's photograph must be produced on paying fees or receiving any amount. Fees once paid will not be refunded.

The College office is open for cash transactions during its working hours.

Mistake, if any, in the receipts issued for payments made should be pointed out then and there and should be corrected on the spot. Complaints made later may not be entertained.

## CERTIFICATES

1. All students admitted in the college have to submit TC, Conduct Certificate, Mark lists, Pass Certificate, Provisional / Original Degree Certificate etc. in the College Office. Normally these Certificates will be returned to the students only when the students leave the College with TC.
2. In an urgent situation a student may request for the return of their Certificates with a written assurance that they will return the same as soon as the need is addressed.
3. For any Certificate from the college, the students have to apply in writing to the Principal.
4. Conduct Certificate is a document which a student has to earn. It will not be issued as a matter of course.
5. The Certificates submitted by a student in the College at the time of admission shall be taken back by the student along with TC within a year





- after the completion of the Course. The college will own no responsibility for the Certificates submitted in the college after one year of leaving the college. After one year Rs.100/- will be levied per year for safe custody of the documents in addition to the late fee for TC.
6. A fee of Rs.200/- will be levied from those who apply for the duplicate copies of the Transfer Certificate.
  7. If a student is expelled from the college for serious misconduct or repeated misbehaviour, the matter will be reported to his parent / guardian and the TC will be sent to his/her home address.
  8. Duplicate identity cards will be issued, if necessary, on a payment of Rs. 100/-.

## ELIGIBILITY FOR FEE CONCESSION & GOVT./UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

Students are eligible for various scholarships given by the national and state governments and the University . Students can apply for these scholarships according to the respective conditions prescribed for each scholarships. All Scholarships except University Merit Scholarship are awarded on the basis of merit cum means, subject to the number allotted each year.

Fee concessions and stipends are available to students of Scheduled Castes/ Tribes or of other backward communities under various schemes of the Government. Students of socially and educationally backward classes and even those of forward communities can enjoy educational concessions, if their parent's annual income is as per the stipulated norm by the government.

Those who are eligible for fee concession must produce the income certificate of the parent from the village officer at the time of admission.

Students should submit the applications for scholarship/concession in the prescribed form in the College office within fifteen days of the commencement of their respective classes.

In the event of a scholarship or concession holder discontinuing his studies during the course of the academic year he shall return the scholarship/ concession amount received before he obtains his certificates.



There are several scholarships such as University, State and National scholarships available to eligible students besides College endowments and help from the Poor Students Aid Fund.

The scholarship holders shall pay their tuition and other fees of the college in full on the prescribed dates.

The continuance of all scholarships and stipends depends on good behaviour and progress in studies. Failure to gain annual promotion means forfeiture of the award. Each holder shall acknowledge receipt of his allowance in an acquittance book.

All scholarships and stipends shall cease with the examination at the end of course for which they are granted.

## ATTENDANCE AND PROMOTION

*(as per the U.O.No.5180/2014/Admin dated 29.05.2014)*

1. A student who absents himself/herself from class during any one period of the day shall lose the full attendance of the session.
2. Students coming late to class will lose half a day's attendance. The teacher at his/her discretion may admit students who come late. He/she may also mark them present on a reasonable excuse.
3. Students have access to MIS, ([www.el-alloysius.in](http://www.el-alloysius.in)), and can get information regarding their attendance any time they want, and any complaints regarding it should be brought to the notice of the Principal within three days.
4. Students have to satisfy attendance requirements for admission to University examinations.
5. Application for condonation will be recommended by the Principal only if he is convinced that the shortage of attendance was due to causes beyond the control of the student and that the application has been endorsed by the H.O.D. concerned. Ordinarily, only prolonged illness will be accepted as a genuine reason for shortage of attendance. Absence without leave will not be condoned under any circumstances.



A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/she secures a minimum of 75% attendance in each semester.

Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 9 days (10%) in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the period of a Degree or condonation of shortage of attendance up to a maximum of 18 days (20%) once in a single chance during the entire course, on genuine medical grounds, may be granted by the University with proper chalan remitted to the university. (Shortage exceeding 9 days (10%) will be condoned only on genuine medical grounds)

Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend the approved activities of college/University with prior concurrence of the Class Teacher/ Head of the Department and the Principal.

Participation in such activities may be treated as presence in lieu of their absence on production of participation/attendance certificate in curricular/ extra curricular activities recommended by the concerned teacher and Head of the Department. It should be limited to 9 days in a semester.

If a student is continuously absent from the class for more than 14 working days without proper permission, the student shall be removed from the rolls.

6. Semester Repetition: Students who have suffered serious health problems, on production of medical certificate issued by a physician not below the rank of a Civil Surgeon on Govt. service, may be permitted to repeat the course if recommended by the Head of the Department. Such students or their parents have to report the matter in writing to the class teacher and the Head of the Department. The medical Certificate should be submitted at the time of rejoining. Such certificates will not be accepted at a later date. The copies of such letters/certificates are to be kept in the Department with dated signature by the Head of the Department for further references. Only such requests following the above mentioned procedures will be validly accepted for benefits of attendance.
7. A student in a Junior class who has earned required attendance progress certificate is eligible for promotion to the next higher class only if he/she has registered for the University examination at the end of the year.



## GENERAL BEHAVIOUR AND DISCIPLINE

The College administration understands discipline as controlled and ordered behaviour that is civilised and ethical. It is the means to an end that is productive and gratifying. We seek to realise this discipline among our students internally through filial exhortation rather than by external coercion. Our aim is to nurture a humane yet dynamic sense of self among all our students. We strive to develop individuals who are calm, confident, alert and adventurous. At the same time we expect them to treasure values of solidarity and mutual respect. With such noble intentions the college administration has laid down the following rules of general behaviour and discipline:

1. Education is the harmonious development of the entire human personality by cultivating everything that is good, beautiful and noble in human nature. Hence it should be the earnest endeavour of all students not only to concentrate on studies but also to cultivate high and noble ideals of life and conduct. Students should take due interest in the moral, academic, cultural and physical activities of the college.
2. Every morning we begin our work with a prayer song at 9.30 a.m. When the bell is given at 9.30 a.m. all the members of staff and students are requested to keep standing in silence till the prayer song ends.
3. Every student shall endeavour in his/her talk, movements, dress and in dealings with the staff and outsiders to conduct himself/herself, everywhere within the college premises and outside, in the manner worthy of a university student. He/she shall salute his/her teachers on the occasion of his/her first meeting them within the precincts of the college, and whenever he/she meets them in public.
4. Students should be modest in their dress. Girls shall wear full skirts, sarees or churidars. Boys shall not wear T. Shirts in the class room. All students should wear the college electronic ID Card attached to the ribbon.
5. Every student shall handle the college property with care. He/she shall not make any marks on the furniture or the walls. Destruction of college



property will entail civil as well as criminal proceedings. Further, those who damage college property will have to pay compensation for the loss incurred.

6. Forming student organizations or getting involved in their activities are strictly banned on campus. The boundary of the campus begins from the main gate near the Higher Secondary School and extends to the sides of the "kole" field. Within its boundary, it encompasses all the buildings and premises owned by the Monastery. Students are forbidden to organize or attend meetings other than those permitted by the Principal in writing. No outsider shall enter the college campus without permission of the college authorities.
7. A joint meeting of the PTA, Staff Council, College Council and Management has resolved to ban campus politics and activities of political organizations in the campus. (as per orders of the Hon'ble High Court of Kerala in R.P.No.435/2003 and WPC No.17148/2012). It has entrusted the College Council to enforce the High Court ruling that prohibits political activities, especially strikes, demonstrations and agitations in the college campus or its premises. Accordingly campus politics and activities of political organizations are banned in the campus. Strict disciplinary action will be taken against students who indulge in such activities. Students may register their complaints, if any, in the Grievance Redressal Cells in the college and seek solutions.
8. Posters, banners or flags are not to be kept or exhibited anywhere in the campus. No pamphlets/leaflets may be distributed inside the campus without the permission of the authority.
9. No programme shall be arranged by associations / clubs in the campus without prior permission of the Principal.
10. Parents and guardians are requested not to ask their children/wards to come away from college during class time, unless in case of real necessity.
11. Irregular attendance, habitual inattention to class work and obscenity in word or deed will be dealt with seriously. Misbehaviour or insubordination



- to teachers will be reported to the Discipline Committee for immediate disciplinary actions, including suspension.
12. Everyone has the full freedom to follow any religion according to their own conscience and is encouraged to practise it; but any form of worship other than catholic is not allowed in the college premises.
  13. The students are welcome to bring to the attention of the authorities any reasonable grievance or difficulties they might have.
  14. a. Tours for not more than three days (ONE working day and TWO holidays clubbed together) may be arranged by the final year students of each department with the consent of the class teacher and the approval of the Head of the Department and the Principal. Students going on tour will have to be accompanied by a male teacher and lady teacher of the department. In case there is no lady teacher, the wife of the accompanying male teacher or the mother of a girl student of the class may accompany the group.
    - b. One day industrial visit/Study Tours may be arranged by the respective teachers in consultation with the class teacher, Head of the Department and with the approval of the Principal.
    - c. Associations such as NCC, NSS, Women's Club, Nature Club and Christals may arrange one day tours, preferably on a holiday, with the permission of the Principal.
  15. Strict disciplinary action will be taken against the students found to have any association with anti-social gangs.

Students are warned against bringing the members of such gangs to the campus.
  16. If the teacher concerned has not turned up to engage the class, the class leader may contact the departments and try to make alternative arrangements. If the leader fails to arrange a teacher to engage the class the students shall not loiter or crowd anywhere in the campus or on the veranda. They must be reading in the Library/reading room.



17. Students shall always wear the Identity Card and produce them whenever asked by a staff of the college, teaching or non-teaching.
18. Students shall enter only those class rooms which are assigned to them. No Student shall enter or leave without permission when a teacher is in the class room. There shall be no unauthorized movement of the students in the corridors of the college buildings during the class time.
19. The furniture in the particular classroom shall not be moved elsewhere or rearranged without the prior permission of the Bursar.
20. Smoking/chewing, use of tobacco, pan-parag, drugs, liquor etc., and all products which are legally banned, or are injurious to health are strictly prohibited inside the college campus. No one is allowed to enter the campus under intoxication. Students shall not possess weapons while they are in the Campus.
21. If any student is sent out of the class or if a student is not allowed to enter the class by a teacher, he/she shall lose the attendance of that session.
22. Boys and girls shall park their two wheelers in the allotted parking areas. No hired or rented vehicles are allowed to be parked in the campus.
23. Students coming to college on two wheelers shall not ride their way to classrooms, library, auditorium or canteen.
24. On no occasions shall the students play out stereo, tape recorders and keyboards for recreational purpose. Students shall not collect funds/materials any purpose without the prior permission of the authority. Unauthorized/personal, celebrations/gatherings of any nature are not permitted in the campus/class rooms. Crackers or fireworks of any magnitude may not be set off or exploded in the campus without the permission of the authorities.
25. Taking photographs of students by students in the campus is strictly forbidden.
26. Ragging is a criminal offence. Police case and other criminal proceedings (as per UGC enforced guidelines) will be initiated against anyone involved in ragging.



27. In view of the Governor's order R.T.No. 346/05/H.Ed. dt. 1-3-2005, the Government has banned Fashion show, Cinematic Dance and use of Mobile Phones, with or without Camera, in the College Campus. If students happen to bring mobile phones, they have to keep it in switched-off position inside the compound wall. Otherwise the phones will be seized and the students will get them back only at the end of the academic year.
28. The public, including former students, will be allowed to enter the college campus only for genuine reasons. They will not be allowed to enter the classrooms and hostel rooms on any account.
29. The following punishments may be imposed on those who violate the guideline/s mentioned above.
  - a. Suspension from the college for three or more days.
  - b. Denial of conduct certificate
  - c. Debarring from contesting the student union election.
  - d. Dismissal for repeated violation of the guidelines.
30. All legal and reasonable grievances of the students will be addressed by the college authorities. In the event of any such grievance, the aggrieved can approach the respective class teacher or students' Grievance Redressal Committee existing in the college. Students can also place their grievances in writing in the General Complaint Box, placed in front of the library. Regarding all these complaints the decision of the Principal shall be final.

## GUIDELINES FOR THE WORKING OF THE COLLEGE UNION

In accordance with the Judgment of the Hon'ble High Court of Kerala, 2003 (2) KLT 582, the St. Aloysius College, Elthuruth has formulated the following Bye-laws for the working of the College Union:-





## 1. Functions of the College Union

The College Union shall have the following functions-

- a. to promote development of character, discipline and performance; cultivate democratic and secular outlook and unity among the students of the college;
- b. to train the students the rights and duties of citizenship;
- c. to impart leadership qualities and the spirit of service;
- d. to develop artistic talents of students and encourage them to address and fight against social problems such as drug menace, ragging, racism, sexual harassment, corruption and communalism.

## 2. Patron

The Principal shall be the Ex-Officio Patron of the St. Aloysius College Union and shall possess overall control over the College Union and its activities. The Principal can suspend the functioning of the College Union at any time, if situation warrants.

## 3. Duties

The college union is duty bound-

- a. to conduct college union activities with the permission and in accordance with the directions of the Principal and the advice of the Teachers of the St. Aloysius College;
- b. to conduct college union activities without any political or organisational or external influence ;
- c. to conduct college union activities in a dignified and disciplined manner without creating any unpleasant situations or inconvenience to any one and without detrimentally affecting the general discipline and reputation of the institution;
- d. to avoid objectionable items/programmes/speeches /subjects that may hamper the best interests of the institution and shall desist from such conduct or words against the management ,Principal, staff, students,



public or other **authorities like the University or the Government** and making expressions against morality and decency .

- e. to suspend any activity, programme or function immediately as and when the Principal directs so, if programs are not done as per the approved plan.

#### **4. Guidelines for the Student Activities**

( Ref. G.O. No. 26483 /G1/15/H. Edn. dated 12.10.2015)

- a. All Celebrations in the Campus, including Union activities, should be held only after getting prior permission from the Head of the Institution/ college. Celebrations of any type should be communicated to the Head of the Institution through concerned Staff Advisor at least five working days prior to the event, with program details, guests attending, source of funds, expenditure estimates etc. The Discipline Committee should monitor and supervise the celebrations in the college.
- b. Student Union activities should be supervised by a Committee chaired by the Head of the Institution with Staff Advisor as Convener, and HODs and Discipline Committee members.
- c. All students have to wear identity tag in the college.
- d. Programs by External Agencies / Professional groups / paid programs such as DJ, musical events, etc. should not be permitted inside the campus. No type of fund raising from students should be permitted, as these practices lead to extortion and misuse of funds. Technical festivals should be limited to technical activities. There is no restriction for students' programs.
- e. Bike race/ motor car race/elephant procession or similar activities should not be permitted inside the campus.
- f. In the interest of the security of students, the local police may be informed in advance about all festival celebrations.



- g. Infrastructure, supportive sound system and light would be provided by the college (expenses will be met from Union fund). Tariff for fund raising is not permissible.
- h. Cultural programme should be staged only with the approval of the Screening committee. Programs are to be ready for screening and review at least 2 days prior to its presentation.
- i. Name of the guest/s should be informed in writing at least five working days prior to the event; after approval of the guest/s, no change is permitted.
- j. Duration of the programmes for College Day / College Union Inauguration etc. is from 9.30 a.m. to 3.00 p.m.
- k. Stage decoration/ anything exhibited on stage should be approved by the committee.

## **5. Liability and Accountability**

For all actions / omissions of the College Union pertaining to the Bye- laws, the members of the College Union shall be jointly and severally liable and accountable. The members of the College Union shall be jointly liable and accountable for all actions of the College Union pertaining to the celebrations of the College Day.

The students are provided an opportunity to express their creativity and writing skills through the publication of the annual college magazine. The following guidelines are set as per the UO No. 71454/CDC-E- SO/2014/Admn.

### **1. Aims**

To give an opportunity to the students to express their literary skills at the college level.

To send the magazine for competitions at the University level

To collect the statistical data about the college and to make it readily available in future for documentation.

To spread the name and fame of the college far and wide.

## 3. Time Frame

All Literature should be collected before 15<sup>th</sup> February

DTP should be ready by 25<sup>th</sup> February

Printing and Publication should be done before 15<sup>th</sup> March

Date of Release before 31<sup>st</sup> March.

## 4. Selection of Literature

- a. The literature and contents should be called for by announcing the subjects and the type of literature needed in all three languages. It should be filed and kept with the Staff Editor.
- b. It can be done through competitions or literary works by students at any point of time during their studies in the college. The directives from the University/Govt.

(UO No. 71454/CDC-E- SO/2014/Admn.) should be strictly followed in every respect.

## 5. Under taking by the Students

It should be mentioned that the literature /issue published in the magazine has not been borrowed or plagiarized.

## 6. Photos

- a. The photos on various activities and programs in the college should be collected and, only the selected ones should be printed.
- b. The essential photos of the college, its founder, patrons and officials should be given necessary prominence. The photos of students/faculty who have excelled in any field should be chosen.



## 7. Cover

- The college may appeal to the students to design the cover and the best one may be selected.
- The name of the magazine can be selected from the entries invited and it should be displayed prominently.
- The cover design and the name of the magazine should uphold our values and academic culture. The name of the artist should be mentioned and given credit.

## 8. Advertisements & Accounts

- As far as possible there should not be any advertisements. In case the expenses go above the allocated amount, advertisements may be accepted with the approval of magazine committee.
- The Staff Editor and the Student Editor are responsible for the accounts, and transparency should be maintained in every respect as per the direction of the Superintendent / Head Accountant.
- Accounts should be settled with an audit report to the Head Accountant at the earliest.
- Once the printing is complete, the copies of the magazine should be submitted to the Office before payment. The Principal, through the Office, makes payment of the printing charge by issuing cheques in the name of the printing press after the delivery of the magazine copies at the college office.

## 9. The Process Before Publishing

- All literature should be collected and edited. DTP should be done after editing. The print outs should be read carefully and any corrections in language, grammar and DTP should be done, as far as possible by the students / faculty of the college.
- The completed DTP should be ready by 25th February.
- The Printers are to be selected after inviting Quotation/Tender.
- The whole process of printing and publishing of the magazine should be under the supervision and guidance of the Staff and Student Editor and should follow the college procedures.
